

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Now Senator DeCamp we will take votes on the question to cease debate.

CLERK: Senator Carsten voting aye. Senator Maxey voting aye.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Senator Newell voting aye. Senator Cope voting aye. Senator Koch voting aye. Senator Kahle voting aye. Senator Goodrich I think has asked to raise the Call.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Mr. President, a point of order.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: State your point.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Mr. President, would it be possible to keep the House under Call to resolve this issue once and for all this afternoon. I think that the issue is clear. I think that the majority of the members want.....

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Yes, Senator Venditte it is possible if the Legislature votes not to raise the Call.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Mr. Speaker, did you not say that this would be the final item that we would be taking up today on the agenda.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: As I say, all you have to do is vote to not raise the Call. So then...

SENATOR VENDITTE: Then a point of order Mr. Chairman. Did you not say that this would be the last item that we would be discussing today?

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: That is correct.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Thank you.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: The motion then is to raise the Call. All those in favor of raising the call vote aye. Those opposed vote nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 6 ayes, 24 nays to raise the Call Mr. President.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: We are still under Call and I believe that a....report the vote on the matter of ceasing debate.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 6 nays to cease debate Mr. President.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Motion carries. Debate ceases. Senator Chambers you may close on your motion. No closing? Senator Simon for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SIMON: A point of information of the Chair. I would like to ask what your interpretation, when it says unanimous consent when one person abstains what would that mean? What was your interpretation. What would your interpretation be on that?
