So, it should be stricken. Section two, also is unconstitutional in that it provided a continuing appropriation year in and year out and that can not do. Then in the other section that is not cited is...which is not shown but it is cited 85-111.01 was language that was contained in appropriation bills some years ago that all employees at the University that was receiving income over \$10,000 had to report all outside income. That is incorrectly placed into the Statute as you can not legislate through an appropriation bill as we all know and that too then was unconstitutional. This is...the bill is merely to clean up these statutes.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Any further discussion on LB 922? All right any further discussion? All those in favor of advancing LB 922 to E & R Initial vote aye. Those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, no nays on the advancement of the bill Mr. President.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: LB 922 is advanced to E & R Initial.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: While the Legislature is in session and capable of doing business I propose to sign and do sign LR 186, 194 and 195. Anything else Mr. Clerk? We will proceed then with LB 737.

CLERK: Read LB 737. There are no amendments pending Mr. President.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Chair recognizes Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, members of the body. This bill has been around here so long that I can't believe that it ever arrived this day, yet it has I think some very good intentions and purpose to be accomplished. This body spends somewhere between 17 and 20 million dollars a year, and I'm trying to help correct and improve the problems of those who are handicapped in terms of their physical and mental capabilities. What the bill intends to do is at the time of marriage license, when the application is made that there would be one more test that would be demanded of the lady and that test is whether or not the individual is immuned to rubella or to German measles as we commonly call them. This can be done very easily simply by the same blood test that you presently have to provide upon application for marriage license, the test for venereal disease. This can all be done at one time and therefore the only thing that the young lady has to give proof of is the fact that she is immune to rubella

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
