SENATOR NEWELL: Well, Senator Stoney, your concerns were brought to me before and my first reaction was to in fact, wait until next year for no other reason than to have a public hearing and let the public address the uniform code. I've contacted other states. There's not been a great deal of opposition to the bill. In fact, there's been no opposition, it just... It's just passed. I thought Senator Mills was opposing but I guess it's just been adopted without much debate and discussion in other states. We have not addressed it. Senator Marsh was planning to offer legislation next year and I was hoping we could save that battle and also deal with some of the problems that we have. We have these violations in other years and another full year before that thing could take place and I would hope that this body would accept the amendment now. Thank you.

SENATOR STONEY: Senator Newell, would you be prepared then to explain the uniform code or would you agree to providing us with a copy of the code...

SENATOR NEWELL: Yes.

SENATOR STONEY: ...so that we could take a look at it before attempting to make a decision on this important issue.

SENATOR NEWELL: Larry, I think I can do... Can I ask you a question? Basically you've been fathering this bill along and I was wondering would you mind if we laid it over? We could print the amendments in the Journal and that would allow people to have an opportunity to look at it. Would that be an acceptable ...?

SENATOR STONEY: I have no objection to that but I would hope that we could do it in the next day that we don't stall it again for another week or so.

SENATOR NEWELL: Well since there's a few people that are really concerned we might just xerox copies and hand it to those few people that are really concerned about the legislation. Would that be acceptable?

SENATOR STONEY: Well, the only objection I have, Senator Newell, I think it is a comprehensive measure and I think everyone in this body should have an opportunity to take a look at those before making a decision.

PRESIDENT: You have one minute.

SENATOR NEWELL: It would take a day or so to put them in the Journal is what I'm saying.

SENATOR STONEY: If you ask unanimous consent to print them today, they will be in tomorrow. We could take it up tomorrow in the Speaker's order.

SENATOR NEWELL: Will they be in the Journal that fast? Will the Clerk answer that? Will they be in the Journal that quick?
