I'm going to give up that money in North Platte and you're going to give up even more and he says to Jerry Warner and he says to Wally Barnett and he says to Shirley Marsh and he says to Roman Luedtke and he says to Neil Simon and he says to Dave Newell and he says to Bill Brennan and he says to Tommy Fitzgerald and he says to Orval Keyes and he says to Frank Lewis and he says to Ron Cope and he says to Jo Ann Maxey and to Jerry Koch and to Larry Stoney and to Pat Venditte and to Bernice Labeledz and to Barry Reutzel, do I have a deal for you. Did I miss somebody? You're going to lose money. Now we have gone just about as far as we're going to go with this and I'm telling you I am to the point that I believe a number are that if we try to work out a reasonable compromise, a reasonable attempt to help and then someone has to make a little hay for themselves, either to sell memberships in an organization or to view films or whatever the motivation and say we're going to put another amendment on the floor. Well, I've had it with that kind of eternal pressure on this Legislature that's tried to wrestle with this problem, this Legislature that's been foremost in trying to resolve the school problems, this Legislature that's tried to address them and sat down in compromise and when we've got those external forces setting outside and they want to be big men and they want to be heroes and they want to put in such a diversity in this Legislature that you can never see the likes of it, so I say this. Let's kill the Dworak motion and move it on and if successful let's just kill the whole bill and do what Senator Dworak always likes to do and that's take it to the people.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. President, I move the previous question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dworak, would you like to close debate with your response?

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, and colleagues, again what this amendment attempts to do is to put LB 757 in its original form. What that does is distributes the money as close as possible to the way it was distributed prior to the passage of LB 33, prior to the petition drive, prior to whatever. I personally think that this is what the intent of the people was when they signed the petition. I always get chided for taking something to the people as if that's some sinister operation. I guess my philosophy of government is a little bit different than other people's. I'm not trying to take money away from certain school districts. That's not my intent. That's not the intent of this amendment. This amendment takes nothing from Senator Lewis' district. It takes nothing from Omaha. It takes nothing from Lincoln that they didn't already have prior to the passage of LB 33. It just puts them into the same position they were in prior to our action last year so if you totally understand that I'm not trying to take away money, that I'm not fronting for anybody, that I'm not selling memberships, that I'm not doing this for any personal gain, I'm merely trying to put this in the same position it was prior to the passage of LB 33 or the petition drive or whatever. I urge the adoption of this amendment.
