So, it maintains that liquor establishments have got to be closed on the primary and general elections on these statewide elections. Okay. That's what's left if you adopt the Committee amendments. They strike everything else in the bill.

SENATOR DWORAK: I move the adoption of the amendments.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simon.

SENATOR SIMON: Senator DeCamp, I just can't let your comments go by without a statement. I appreciate your explaining it the way that you did but I think perhaps in view of trying to be brief you may have been a little bit...no, I'd say more crude was more the word I was looking for. I would suggest it certainly is not the intent of this Legislature to cast disparaging remarks upon the people that are affected by this bill and I think perhaps in your intent to quickly explain that you were a little bit less than compassionate in your delivery and I'm sure that was not intended. So, I wanted that clarified for the record.

PRESIDENT: Do you want the record cleaned up that way Senator DeCamp?

SENATOR DWORAK: I move the adoption of the Committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Maxey.

SENATOR MAXEY: Mr. President, I have some questions of Senator De Camp, please.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Yes.

SENATOR MAXEY: Senator DeCamp, is there any guarantee that the young people who will be removing the busboys or persons taking the liquor from the tables, that they would not indulge in it themselves? What's left in the empty cans if the cans are not empty or the glasses are not empty?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Well, I guess training at home and the employer relies on who he hires. You know if you've got a 16 year old kid busboy and he's drinking all kinds of empty beer cans, I really think you'd fire him pretty quickly. Reality says no, this isn't a problem. It's worked in other states.

SENATOR MAXEY: It's worked in other states?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Yes.

SENATOR MAXEY: And it's been doing all right right now without us having this amendment, right?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Well, you know you can argue that on anything. You say something is going all right and at the same time you're putting added inconvenience and costs to the employer. It's more efficient when you hire busboys to be able to hire a 16 or 17 year old kid who can clean the whole table. The way it is now in certain places they won't even hire a 16 or
