

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Senator Dworak, at the 1921 they're projecting a hundred eighty nine bushels and I for one, feel that this certainly isn't out of line because I think Senator Kahle or myself could say that this year was in some areas, not the very best but most of the corn made from a hundred and forty seven to a hundred and seventy five bushels this coming year and with the continued up-breeding in the seed itself, this is not unreasonable whatsoever. There's a lot of two hundred bushel corn in our area this year.

SENATOR DWORAK: Thank you, Senator Rasmussen.

PRESIDENT: Are you ready for the vote? The question is, shall LR 208 be adopted? Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of the resolution, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The resolution is adopted. Now we go to LR 209.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 209 was introduced by the Public Works Committee and signed by the members thereof: (Read LR 209.) Mr. President, that may be found on page 1559 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, did you wish to be heard on the matter?

SENATOR WARNER: I wanted to vote yes on that resolution. I assume on Final Reading you can do voice vote. I didn't get the button pushed.

PRESIDENT: It's not a record vote. It just shows it was adopted 29... I didn't see you, Senator Warner. I'm sorry.

SENATOR WARNER: That's no problem.

PRESIDENT: Senator Rasmussen.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Mr. President, I would ask that the Clerk expedite my resolution, please, if it's at all possible.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dworak, did you wish to be heard on this one? Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, in the last few minutes a sheet has been placed on your desk explaining fully what this resolution does. It merely asks for a review of the old 1902 Federal Reclamation Act that was passed by the United States Congress. We have felt for a long long time that the provisions in this 1902 provision has long been outdated. It limits the land that could be operated under irrigation through a federal project to one hundred and sixty acres. Times have certainly changed. It also has to do with the people in the family that may inherit a farm or a piece of property and then along with that which they already own they would immediately have to sell that inherited property or they would have to reside upon it. We feel that a time is here to make a change. I think the resolution explains itself very very well and the sheet of paper that was laid on your desk goes further into explaining yet. Unless there are questions I will ask for the adoption of the resolution.
