PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Senator Koch moves to indefinitely postpone LB 210.

PRESIDENT: That lays over Senator. We go to LB 128.

CLERK: Mr. President, your Committee on Business and Labor whose chairman is Senator Richard Maresh to whom we referred Legislative Bill 943 instructs that we report the same back to the Legislature with a recommendation it be advanced to General File with amendments. 944 indefinitely postponed. Mr. President, Senator Carsten gives notice that the Committee on LR 156, the oversight committee, will be meeting immediately upon adjournment today in Room 1113. Mr. President, Senator Chambers moves to reconsider our action on LB 65. Mr. President, I have an Attorney General's opinion addressed to Senator Richard Lewis regarding LB 795. That will be inserted in the Legislative Journal in full. Mr. President, Senator Lamb asks unanimous consent to print amendments to LB 872 in the Legislative Journal. Senator Simon to print amendments to LB 713 in the Legislative Journal. Mr. President, Legislative Bill 128. There are E and R amendments pending to 128 Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: There are E and R amendments to 128. Do you want to take them Senator Mills?

SENATOR MILLS: I move the adoption of the E and R amendments to LB 128.

PRESIDENT: All in favor say aye. Contrary say nay. They're adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Maresh moves to amend Mr. President. The amendments are seven pages of amendments. They have not been printed.

PRESIDENT: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, I handed copies of these amendments twice. This bill has been on Select File for a long time and I was afraid the people lost their first copy so just a few days ago I placed another copy on your desk. I'm sure that you still have that. What it does, it amends the bill to not allow unemployment compensation for people that are hired by the hour during the break, between semesters, in other words, during semester break, if these people know that they will still be with that school system. That they will not be able to file for unemployment compensation. I move that this amendment be adopted. Mr. President, this was called to my attention by Dr. Robinson from Westside Public School and he stated that Westside, this could mean as much as \$55,000 for unemployment compensation if all the people that are hired by the district take advantage of this. Although they have spent as much as \$30,000 for this unemployment compensation. So, I think it's something that we need to specify in law that these people are not eligible for that compensation.

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
