

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, owing to the hour again that is going to take a lot of time to explain it and I don't want to interrupt Senator Kelly's heroic ability to get 25 votes on this. So I'll withdraw the amendment.

PRESIDENT: What else do you have Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator F. Lewis moves to indefinitely postpone LB 877.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: I think that I will wait on that one until Select File till we see how the other two are disposed of.

PRESIDENT: Is that withdrawn then Senator Frank Lewis? What else do you have on the bill?

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Sam Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I have passed out to you a copy of an analysis I received from the staff of legislature concerning this measure and it is improperly entitled 887 and it should have been 877 on the memorandum which was sent to you. It is interesting, and I looked at it, and I called it a question with respect to the state colleges as one of the systems that has facilities across the State of Nebraska and I do think that we need to take another look, a seriously at where this facility should be located. I, at this point and time, am certainly not convinced that Grand Island is the only location which should be considered. I respect, of course Senator Kelly, for attempting to put up another structure in Grand Island, but I do think that we need to look at some other factors. Senator Frank Lewis did mention Kearney and it is interesting to note the comments of Donald Webb who was Director of the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center, the Crime Commission, some comments that he made when they were studying this issue in 1974. He said about Kearney State College, it is the logical first choice for the location of the Training Center. Like Grand Island, Kearney is centrally located, this is an important consideration not only for the user of the center but for the problems that will be encountered related to relocation of an organization of this nature. The staff could commute back and forth until their homes had been sold and so forth. So, by their own admission of the people who are making the study this was their first choice at that point and time. I think that it is also interesting to look at the availability of class room space and dormitory space as this memorandum does just at the state colleges but I think that we should look at other facilities like Hiram Scott College in Scottsbluff and perhaps even some of the junior colleges that could be utilized. Also distributed to you is a resolution calling for a joint study between the Judiciary and the Education Committee to decide what would be a more suitable location. I would hope in summary that we would not advance Senator Kelly's LB 877, but that we would go with an interim study this summer conducted by these two committees to decide where this facility should indeed be located, and answer a number of other questions before we push this bill forward.
