That would be what I would suggest. Question? Senator Lewis has a question.

SENATOR SAVAGE: The lights that are on are are Senator Chambers, his light is on. Do you want...then Senator F. Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Senator Warner left with me the amendments to the emergency fund, 965, which has to be disposed of. He asked me to handle those today, if you will take that up or take them up the first thing in the morning.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Senator Luedtke, do you care to respond?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: It won't do any good to get them done tonight because you can't get them engrossed anyway and because of the machine being down. We can take those up the first thing in the morning with those motions, or take them up even ahead of those motions. So we could...I think that we will take that up the very first, because that is essential.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: All righty.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Then we will take the motions and then Final Reading and then all of the Resolutions.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Chair recognizes Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, Senator Luedtke, wouldn't you have a much better chance if you moved it back tonight because of the requirement that they lay over a day before they get to Final Reading, if we handled them tonight, wouldn't we have a much better chance....

SENATOR LUEDTKE: It has nothing to do with it. It is the Engrossment that we are concerned with. The Engrossment is what we have to do, and we can't get it engrossed until tomorrow anyway. If it is not engrossed tomorrow it is all over anyway. So, we are not gaining anything by doing it tonight.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Well Mr. Speaker, would you be able to tell us what these ten motions are? Maybe it is such a thing that thinking them over we might have less of them in the morning.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: All right, I would certainly entertain the Clerk giving us just reading the motions real quickly so that everyone knows what they are. Will you just go ahead and....just jot down the bills so that you know what we are talking about.
