We feel that this will add additional revenue and it would also serve as somewhat of a control on the control of the different species. We have a companion bill coming up next possibly which we will deal with later but this only expands the list so that we can have additional controls over the fur bearing list, because these animals are being taken in record numbers right now and they would like to have some sort of control so they can control the numbers of animals being taken.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Any further discussion? Senator Cullan. The Chair recognizes Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Senator Reutzel, a question of Senator Reutzel please.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Senator Reutzel, will you respond?

SENATOR CULLAN: Senator Reutzel, you are not trying to sneak a coyote bill in on us are you?

SENATOR REUTZEL: Trust me, Sam.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: I believe that gives you enough and it, all those in favor then of introducing Request #777 will vote aye, opposed nay. This will require 30 votes. Record the vote.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 3 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to introduce.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: The motion carries. The bill is introduced. Read the bill.

CLERK: (Read LB 552 by title for the first time. May be found on page 391 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Now we come to the last request of the morning, Request #779. The Chair recognizes Senator Reutzel.

SENATOR REUTZEL: Mr. President, this bill, some might construe as a get even bill, but at the present situation we have the surrounding states will not allow Nebraskans to enter their states and have a nonresident trapping permit. We would like to change that situation and have Nebraska be on a reciprocal basis with these states and as I alluded to in the previous bill it is only because we have an influx of people from other states coming in and we can not control the numbers of animals which they have taken in certain areas
