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LB 457

is the Constitutional Revision's concern with the constitutional aspects, whether it is Urban Affairs concern with municipal revenues or the Revenue Committee's concern with in lieu of tax payments, that each of those vested interests would be protected in that committee. Now the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee has heard consistently things with regards to electric rates and electric rates structure and there has been no interest until this bill came up to try and move any of those other power bills to Public Works nor to take any of the other electric rate bills that have advanced and move them to Public Works. So that although I would not mean to imply that Senator Goodrich does not know how to make a kill motion, I certainly know that he does know how to make a kill motion but I do think that really this is just a veiled attempt to bury the bill and that the original reference of the bill was correct. The Miscellaneous Subjects Committee has developed the expertise in electric rates and can apply that to this bill if there is a desire for further study but nobody has really explained what sending it back to a committee would accomplish other than to get the bill off of the floor and I think that is the goal. There is nothing a further study that I can see accounted the utilities presented their testimony at the hearing, the amendments from the Rural Electric Association were drafted into the bill. They were given plenty of opportunity to develop those amendments. The other power districts were encouraged to bring in amendments. So what more is there to be done, what more can be done by another committee. I would support Senator Newell's motion. I think that the original reference of this bill is correct, and I think until we develop a consolidated energy committee, that we would keep the fragmented system that we have on power bills and I guess I interpret the understanding of this Legislature and their sentiment against the energy committee to mean that they prefer the fragmented approach that we have had so far.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Simon, do you wish to speak to the Newell amendment?

SENATOR SIMON: Yes, I do, Mr. Chairman. I rise to oppose the Newell amendment. It does get rather interesting at times when we have people on the same side such as Senator Fowler and myself and we are rising in differences but I wish we would just dispose of the bill one way or the other today. I see no advantage in hiding behind the committee system, to refer the bill back to committee. If the bill has got the votes, it has got the votes. If you want to kill it, kill it. Let's not play around. I have offered
