to us that we should learn very valuably from this but those veterans, those soldiers who fought, should not be castigated, should not be looked at as lesser military men than their forebearers, their forefathers, and for that reason, this body and every state in the Union should recognize the Vietnam veteran for what he did. He served his country, and if the war was wrong, it was his country that made the mistake, not that individual soldier. For that reason I urge the adoption of this resolution.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch, your light is on. Senator Newell was closing.

SENATOR KOCH: May I make a point to the Chair?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes, sir.

SENATOR KOCH: That Senator Newell was oversimplifying the business of politics and wars. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Thank you. The motion is the adoption of LR 86. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on the adoption of the resolution.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion carried. The amendment is adopted.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: Will the Clerk read LR 90 please?

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 90. Read. Mr. President, that resolution is found on page 90 of the Journal, 1957, excuse me, of the Legislative Journal.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Wagner.

SENATOR WAGNER: Mr. Speaker, members and colleagues, this resolution was introduced by Senators Kahle, Cope, Cullen, Haberman, Duis and myself and it recognizes six young executives with great potential leadership. These young men range in age from 27 to 39. They are graduates of various colleges and their employment ranges from teachers to farmers to agri-businessmen and their activities are in such things as Jaycees, Chambers of Commerce and other involvement. A year ago we had six Japanese young men come from Japan and they spent approximately six weeks in the area of Nebraska,
