SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, Senator Stoney, you asked a question. Senator Stoney, you asked a question why newspapers should be let out and the answer is because they carry a big stick so I support the amendment and hope we keep it in.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Question.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp, I'm sorry. Okay, do I see five hands? All those in favor vote aye, opposed no to cease debate. Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, debate is ceased. The Chair recognizes Senator Stoney to close on his amendment.

SENATOR STONEY: Mr. Speaker, just briefly I know that we all are serious about adopting a law here in our state that will address litter and the total litter problem and I know as I drive through my neighborhood and an urban community, I do not know if it is true in the rural areas or not, but along the various fences in the neighborhoods and along the cyclone fences that encompass many of the schoolyards I do not see bottles and cans. I see newspaper. So I think if we want to address this legitimately that there should be no exclusions and therefore, I move the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is on the adoption of the Stoney amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? The motion is the adoption of the Stoney amendment to LB 120. Have you all voted? Have you all voted?
