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and they're not. We all like to do things in an orderly fashion, and that just cannot occur in the legislative process. But I am willing...I'm willing for us to put the cards out there and say, okay, we're going to have a limitation. It will not affect me personally. It never affected me when I was chairman of the Education Committee. Senator Rumery knows how I hated to introduce committee bills, and I turned back a hell of a lot more than I asked the committee to introduce, and the committee kept me honest even than those I wanted to. I don't like to do that personally, but I think the issue has become such a cliché among those who do not wish to be serious students of the Legislature. I think there is a superficial attempt to make issues in here, because some who are supposed to be looking at the issues do not have the depth nor the inclination to look at the major issues before the Legislature, so then there is an attempt to talk about items that are easy to talk about. It's a lot easier to talk about number of bills and to write about number of bills than it is to talk about valuation. It's a lot easier to talk about who's in their seat or who is not at what particular time than it is to talk about substantive tax issues, or substantive education issues, and it's a lot easier on behalf of the citizen who is there, who doesn't really care to spend all his time looking at issues up here before the Legislature. The typical person in this country and in this state is interested in coming home at 5:00, is interested in either playing golf or probably not interested in it but he moseys along and he talks to his children and he eats his dinner, and he doesn't sit around and say, I wonder what the Legislature did today...I wonder how many bills Vard Johnson introduced today, because that's the most important thing in my life...because that is the image. But I say if we need to look at it, and if you think this is going to solve the problem, then let's do it with this limitation number. But I suspect you are going to find out next year exactly that we're going to have some of the same kind of concerns, some of the same kind of criticisms, but I for one have always been in favor of change, sometimes to prove that I told you so.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You have one minute.

SENATOR LEWIS: So, Mr. President, I think with the rule change that we have now, that for those that are interested in decorum and not substance, for those that are interested in show and not degree of looking at issues, for those that are interested in those kind of facade, that
