Mr. President, I have three new resolutions. The first is offered by Senator DeCamp. (Read LR 179 as found on pages 114-120 of the Legislative Journal.) Mr. President, that resolution will be properly laid over. Mr. President, new resolution, LR 180 offered by Senator Beutler. (Read LR L80 as found on pages 120-121.) Mr. President, that too, will be properly laid over. Mr. President, LR 181 offered by Senator Ray Powers. (Read LR 181 as found on pages 121-122.) That too, Mr. President, will be properly laid over.

Mr. President, Senator DeCamp asks unanimous consent to print amendments to LB 221 in the Legislative Journal and Senator Keyes asks unanimous consent to print amendments to LB 44 in the Legislative Journal.

Mr. President, I have a notice of meeting by the Committee on Committees for January 16 regarding gubernatorial appointees.

Mr. President, two new bills, LB 630 offered by the Agriculture and Environment Committee and signed by the members thereof. (Read by title for the first time, LB 630-633 as found on pages 123-125 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: At this time the Chair will recognize Speaker Marvel for purposes of explanation of some of the following procedures today and throughout the session. Speaker Marvel.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I would like to have the attention of the Legislature. Refer first of all to the green sheet, the agenda, and then when we get through talking about that we will talk for a moment about the yellow sheet. We now find ourselves on the agenda for the first day of this session down to item #9. You will note that item #9 includes new bills which the Clerk has read and then there is General File and Select File items. That means that if we run out of other business we would intend to come back and begin to clean up General File bills that are holdover from the last session as well as Select File. So where you see that item in there on the agenda, the purpose of that is to be certain that we meet and have work to do that will carry us through the entire day. There has been some question about whether or not we meet half days like today. If this legislative body reverts to using a full day's session only half time you will not be able to confront, argue and pass on a number of bills. So to the best of my ability, asking your cooperation, I am going to fight any attempt to have a part-time day. Now in the agenda or the calendar will be in the Journal and it is assumed that those committees who ordinarily would meet on Friday, if the Fridays off, I see nothing wrong with the committees setting hearings, let's say the Friday morning so that you can keep abreast of the work load.
