

slip back now. Let's not slip back and make twice as long, double the time between valuations and updating and keeping things recorded and proper. That is dangerous.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the reason the bill was put in to begin with was because that many areas cannot get the job done every year. Now you know as well as I do that we pass legislation here and after we pass it find that we have got problems with it. So what do we do? We come back and try and remedy those problems. Mr. Harrington from the Department of Revenue testified before the committee in his judgment if we went every two years that counties would have an opportunity to keep it close to current valuations instead of trying and not getting the job done annually. It would appear to us on the committee that his reasoning was solid and justified, and it was in that light that we advanced this bill, not only for the rural areas, Senator DeCamp, but for the urban areas as well. I think that your motion is not proper. We are attempting to get this job done correctly, realistically in the way that it can be done. I would hope that you would not support the kill motion and that we move this bill over and keep our appraisals and our valuations moving as we are attempting to do right now. I think that it will work. I think that it will be more accurate and will be accepted more readily. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: The proposition is the indefinite postponement of 742. Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Well, Mr. President and members of the body, I am going to rise to oppose the kill motion. I think what we have to look at here is the realistic way in which we are going to evaluate and re-evaluate property each and every year, and frankly that is a task that is not going to be done very well if we do continue with our every year sort of proposal. Now this bill very carefully says that we will put new values on line each year, but we are not going to go through the whole expensive tedious and long process of re-evaluating each and every year, that instead we are going to do that every two years, and in the end I think that is practical. Now let me stop for a moment and talk about something else. There are times, Senator DeCamp, and others, when you allow or try to allow administrative
