SENATOR VENDITTE: But it doesn't say that though, Rex.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Okay, Rex, I understand. That is all, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Haberman amendment to the DeCamp amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. We are voting on the Haberman amendment. Okay, record. Is this the amendment to the committee amendments?

CLERK: 16 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion carried. The amendment is adopted.

Now when you are working with state government you run into where all the state offices sometimes are closed for three days in a row and the Governor may not be able to get the information he needs. Now his staff can be available but possibly the computer or possibly the other departments he has to go to there is nobody there so that cuts him down to two days.
