CLERK: 918.

SENATOR DeCAMP: 918, that is the grasshopper thing. It has no money in it and it is already advanced.

CLERK: 964.

SENATOR DeCAMP: 964, is my Constitutional Amendment that simply says the Legislature has got to start dealing with the property tax issue and suggest that be put to the people and they mandate we do it. Either it will fair or succeed.

CLERK: 611.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Oh that is power transmission lines. I think that we need to have that because we are going to have a lot of power lines moved this year. This is a technical thing that needs to be done.

CLERK: 992.

SENATOR DeCAMP: 992, this is the adoption bill. I think that we have got that in a form that everybody is pretty much agreed upon this time and I really don't see any reason to spend 15-20 minutes more on it.

CLERK: 933 with the Hoagland amendment on it.

SENATOR DeCAMP: 933, I don't know the first dawgone thing about that. But, I'm sure that it must be okay, and Hoagland having an amendment on it, me suggesting that it be approved, must really prove that it is okay, because I question usually what Peter does pretty carefully and if somebody says Peter's amendment is okay, it must be okay.

CLERK: 991 with the Nichol-Venditte amendment.

SENATOR DeCAMP: 991, okay, this is the only thing that I think you could legitimately say has got some controversy, but, 991 is the ban the bong bill, or whatever. 991 we are suggesting you put the exact committee amendments on it and let it get on Final and let Patrick find out that it is unconstitutional in the World Herald and everybody else. Okay? That is all the motion is and I suggest that this is a way to get these things done, get them back so that we can make sure that they are on Final.
