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Ag Committee as indicated by Senator Eret. I sit in the Ag Committee and I did not support it. I oppose the amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Barrett.

SENATOR BARRETT: Mr. President, members, I rather like the idea of Senator Kahle's amendment to the committee amendment and I truly do and I rise in support. I think Senator Jacobson hit it right on the head. Farmers have been buying grain over the fence for years and years and years. It is commonplace at harvest time. It is the accepted practice, and all of a sudden we are requiring licensing and bonding. It is really rather silly. Enforcement problems of the PSC, administrative nightmare, increased cost not only to the State of Nebraska but certainly to the livestock feeders themselves. I think it is a fine idea. I support the amendment to the committee amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Pappas.

SENATOR PAPPAS: Mr. President, colleagues, I want to compliment Senator Barrett. That was a very fine talk for somebody that is not directly associated to agriculture but it displayed a lot of common sense and forethought in his thinking. It was very nice. I rise to support the Kahle amendment. Where we have been involved in agriculture for a good number of years, and like Senator Barrett alluded to, that this is a common practice. It is also a very common practice for a lot of farmer-feeders to wait until the last moment before they decide if they are going to put cattle in, feed cattle, what type of cattle, and how much grain they are going to put up and how much they are going to buy. Because of this, this would create a nightmare with the PSC. It would create a nightmare of bookkeeping for the farmer for the decisions and also... the basis of the idea isn't bad but there is too many areas need clarified as along the silage line and the grain content of it, who does it, when they do it, who reports them, the administrative cost of it, and everything else. For that reason I am going to support the Kahle amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: (Mike off.)

PRESIDENT: I don't think so. Senator Beutler, did you want to ask the question? Senator Haberman, yes.
