

completed soil surveys. Of the 75 that have completed, 63 are currently using the soil surveys. The last 12 just completed the surveys in 1984; 11 of the 12 have completed their surveys in adequate time to factor them into the 1985 assessment; 1 of the 12 has not. Okay, it just hasn't got it done. In any event, the Department of Revenue has suggested to the committee, and I think rightfully so, that this ongoing process of putting...of doing the soil surveys and classifying land in accordance with the soil surveys should not be stopped simply by the passage of Amendment 4, because it would have been done in any event.

SENATOR HABERMAN: You did not answer my question.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Which was?

SENATOR HABERMAN: My question...I understand everything you said. My question, was, Senator Johnson, will it penalize some counties and make a difference in the assessment if a soil survey is not used? Yes or no.

SENATOR LABEDZ: You have one minute, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, he took all the time giving his speech.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: No, it will not penalize a county that has not completed a soil survey and will not use it. It will not penalize that county.

SENATOR HABERMAN: In other words, it will not penalize any county whether they use them or don't use them.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: They will not be penalized if they have not completed their soil survey and don't use it. If they have completed their soil survey...

SENATOR HABERMAN: Will there be some counties that have a higher value due to this information than those counties who don't have the information?

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: It works both ways.
