

wind and the diligence of the Ralston, Millard Volunteer Fire Departments as well as the Omaha Fire Department, there were no injuries. The bill is simple and straightforward. It requires that any businesses having a stationary tank of over 1,000 gallons notify the State Fire Marshal of the type of chemical that is stored in the tank, and then in turn the State Fire Marshal passes on the information to the local fire departments, the local volunteer as well as all fire departments including the Lincoln and Omaha. The bill is supported by the volunteer fire departments as well as the State Fire Marshal and the cities, most of them, the City of Omaha that was affected by the accident. I urge the passage of LB 383.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Haberman, please.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, a question of Senator Abboud, please.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Would you respond, Senator Abboud, please.

SENATOR ABOUD: Yes.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Abboud, in the committee amendment, did it say anything about up to a 1,000 gallons, they are exempt, is that correct?

SENATOR ABOUD: Yes. In excess of 1,000 gallons.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Does this include gasoline?

SENATOR ABOUD: Petroleum products are excluded as well as natural gas.

SENATOR HABERMAN: It includes gasoline and diesel fuel then, correct?

SENATOR ABOUD: No, it excludes gasoline.

SENATOR HABERMAN: It includes gasoline...

SENATOR ABOUD: Excludes. It doesn't include gasoline or diesel.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Does not?
