I just don't know the answer but when you said an attorney such as, for example, Senator Chambers, and I am not an attorney, it shows how that such as language can cause a problem.

I also want to mention the fact, and I have only got one minute left, but when Senator Newell introduced the bill and passed the bill that made studded snow tires illegal for use in the State of Nebraska, at that time, and we mentioned this this morning when I asked Senator Morehead the question, she said out of state cars and nonresidents would have to adhere to the Nebraska laws. At that point, I remember when we made studded snow tires illegal, out of state cars did not have to obey the law of studded snow tires being illegal and, therefore, that is one of the reasons I took that to court because the people from Iowa and from Offutt Air Force Base could come into the state and use studded snow tires, yet the people of the State of Nebraska would have had a fine had they had on their studded snow tires because at that point they were illegal. So we have got many ifs in this bill, with the studded snow tire bill...
