CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to return LB 389, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The bill is returned. Senator Rod, would you like to move, please.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: I'd just move for the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is, shall the Rod Johnson amendment be adopted? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of Senator Johnson's amendment to the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The amendment is adopted. Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. President, I'd move to advance the bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: You've heard the motion. All in favor say aye. Opposed nay. It is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Beutler would move to return the bill for specific amendment. (See Beutler amendment found on page 2360 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Beutler, please.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, this is a smaller amendment. It has to do with Section 11 which is on page 10 of the bill. That particular provision indicates that there are certain individuals who can enforce the provisions of the Grain Buyer Act. Included among those individuals are the Attorney General. But with regard to the Attorney General it says that the Attorney General can only act upon request. I have a couple of different problems with that. First of all it is not clear who the request has to come from but, secondly, that particular philosophic concept conflicts with 84-204 of the statutes which basically says that the Attorney General shall have
