CLERK: 19 ayes, 1 nay to go under call.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. The house is under call. Members now look up to the front and record your presence light. Turn on your green light, members. Senator Harris. Senator Wesely, Schmit, Vard Johnson, Conway, DeCamp, Barrett. Senator Landis and Senator Beutler. Harris, Senator Harris. All members are here. The house is completely here. Roll call vote, Senator? And may you please be quiet now (gavel) under the balconies and press up here, please. Call the roll, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken as found on page 2639 of the Legislative Journal.) 22 ayes, 24 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. We're back to LB 713 and there are amendments on the bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to amend the bill, Mr. President. (Chambers amendment appears on pages 2639-43 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Mr. Speaker, do you wish to address us?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes, I was. Did you say 713?

PRESIDENT: We're at five o'clock.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Well, may I say something, Mr. President?

PRESIDENT: Yes, go ahead.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Mr. President, when you bracket something you don't necessarily mean that you come back to that or that you go to that at that time. It simply means that you do not talk about it before that time. For example we had 157 that was bracketed till May 15 and we did not take that up May 15. We took it up today. So it is not like setting a parameter of time in which you talk, but that you cannot take it up before that time. I'm suggesting you stay on 127 till you reach some conclusion of some kind rather than shoving it back because there is a way to come back to 127.

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
