

those boards of trustees of vocational technical schools make decisions to go to their maximum overlevy authority as permitted by this bill. Now, folk here say, well, they probably won't do that. Saying they probably won't do that doesn't mean that it won't be done. It can well be a situation where spending follows revenue and it is conceivable that they could go to the full overlevy authority. Senator Wesely has pointed out so very well how we in this body need to be very reflective about the role and mission statement of our vocational technical schools before we willy-nilly grant additional taxing authority. At this point LB 796 represents the willy-nilly grant of additional taxing authority which is far broader than it needs to be without any concomitant reflection...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: ...of role and mission. I personally believe that LB 796 ought to be indefinitely postponed. The issues that Central Vocational Tech wants to raise can be raised on the other bill that has come out of Education Committee which simply extends the life of the overlevy authority to 1992. That's the appropriate bill to address the specific problem that Central Vocational Tech has and I would ask that LB 796 be indefinitely postponed.
