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negative reflection on me when people sit down to look at what has actually been done. It will be a reflection on them and their inability to read and deal directly with the very bill that they have attached their name to. So as far as the bracketing motion, I don't have any feeling one way or the other.

PRESIDENT: Motion to bracket. Anyone else? Senator Higgins, are you rising to speak?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to say, first of all, that I am very saddened to see that this bill which does not mention Naziism or anything to do with B'nai B'rith, has been mentioned in a World Herald article. In it they said Senator Jerry Chizek said hundreds of known groups nationwide share a philosophy of racism and hatred. Senator Beutler, when he got up to speak, talked about Naziism and that this is what this bill was designed to more or less defeat groups like that rising up again. Later in this article from the World Herald they talk about certain members of the Legislature, their aides and such, being Jewish, so that it would appear if you vote against this bill, you are going to be anti-Jewish, anti-Semitic. I have been accused of that in spite of the fact that I had a legislative aide that was Jewish and because he was fortunate enough to be offered a job that paid him \$10,000 a year more, after the session was over he left. But he wrote me a very kind note saying how grateful he was for the time he spent with me and how much he had learned from me, especially about caring about other people. I was accused in a letter of being anti-Jewish because I made the statement on the floor one day about Protestants, Catholics and Hebrews. When Israel had its 25th Anniversary of independence, every Omaha senator was invited or requested to come to the celebration and the parade they had and it was raining cats and dogs. One senator showed up for the celebration of Israel's independence from Omaha. That was Senator Marge Higgins. Who will remember those things if I vote against this bill because I, too, share the same fears of Senator DeCamp and Senator Schmit. In the beginning I was very much for it. I am not for paramilitary groups. I am not for organizing and training people to have riots. I am opposed to them. We went through them in the 1960s in Senator Chambers' district where they rioted and buildings were burned and people were injured and clubs were wielded. We saw it all through the civil rights movement. And yet I

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
