

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would move to indefinitely postpone the bill.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator DeCamp, on the motion to indefinitely postpone.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I will not...do you want to take it up?

SENATOR LANDIS: This is Select File, I am not sure...

SENATOR DECAMP: Oh.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...that we have the day delay on Select File.

SENATOR DECAMP: I think we adopted that.

SENATOR LANDIS: All right, in that case there is an option and the option is to be exercised by the introducer and since the measure is a committee measure, Senator Johnson will make that decision.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Take it up.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I do not want to take a lot of time. This is the same concept that was before the Legislature, I believe it was last year, received a great deal of debate. Ultimately, the bill was vetoed by the Governor and the Legislature chose not to override the veto or maybe it was never taken up, I don't recall which one. The point is, this would attempt to do something that has been unconstitutional, has been rendered unconstitutional by the courts thus far. That is to tax mail order houses and I think there is only one or two other states that attempt this, maybe one, and I am not sure but what they aren't in the courts now on the issue. I think the Revenue Department should direct their attention to collecting those taxes which they can and which are legitimate and cease chasing pie in the sky until such time as at the federal level or through the courts this process is determined constitutional. So rather than go through the veto process, rather than go through the passage of something that will not accomplish anything and it will hurt only Nebraska
