

are many people in my district who have come to me with similar problems, many of the problems that Senator Higgins has talked about, and although there are provisions in the law now, I think possibly in the future we may have to look at the problem of the stolen property and getting the property back from the pawnbroker. So I would simply say that, but I do agree with Senator Johnson that they are not related and I would move the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Pappas, would you like to close on the bill, on the advancement of the bill?

SENATOR PAPPAS: Just very briefly, statute 69-204, then it continues over to 69-205, explains the procedures on a daily basis that pawnbrokers have to take to ensure they know who brings what merchandise in, how they report it to the police, if you want to take time to read it. I think it was fair'y well explained by Senator Chizek and I'd ask for the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: You have heard the motion. All in favor of advancing the bill vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 5 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: LB 87 is advanced. Mr. Clerk, do you have anything to put in at this time?

CLERK: Yes, sir, I do. Mr. President, new A bill, LB 40A by Senator Goodrich. (Read by title for the first time as found on page 348 of the Legislative Journal.)

I have a hearing notice from the Education Committee signed by Senator Withem. Hearing notice from the Banking Committee signed by Senator Remmers.

I have motions from Senator Pappas to withdraw 168 and Senator Haberman, 756. Those will be laid over, Mr. President. That is all that I have, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lynch is here now and we passed over a couple of items and Senator Barrett has given his blessing to go back to pick those up at this time. We will take up LR 25 at this time. Mr. Clerk.
