

we shouldn't adopt the amendment. You run the risk sometimes of taking on amendments that you might make some people mad, I think possibly hurt the bill, but I don't see any particular reason why this amendment wouldn't fit into the section that Senator Wesely has described. And I am supportive of the concept, and I would urge the body to adopt the amendment and advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Smith, please.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would, also, rise to support the amendment. I think that for any of us who particularly live in the rural areas and have had dealings with those folks in the rural areas that had the start-ups for these kinds of programs as far as the pantry is concerned, and the fresh food produce, those kinds of things, in this difficult time in the economy, particularly, I think that this is the time that we need to be supporting this kind of an amendment, and I would just support it and ask the body to do the same. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Smith. Senator Wesely, would you like to close. All right, the question is the adoption of the Wesely amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. This requires 25 votes. We are on Select. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.
