And, Mr. President, a unanimous consent request from Senator Pirsch to withdraw as co-sponsor of LB 645.

PRESIDENT: No objections, so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 255 was introduced by Senator Wesely. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 14, referred to the Health and Human Services Committee for hearing, advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments pending, Mr. President.
