

but perhaps in others in the future to be able to have that kind of a fund where a prospective purchaser could make an offer contingent upon zoning knowing that if that enhanced value didn't occur that at least they had a refund without an unnecessary delay. It also would place the fund, the money, into the General Fund to be appropriated rather than the Cash Fund as it is proposed. The second amendment also affects a possible land sale which would be by the Department of Social Services putting in the provisions the receipts for that would be placed in the Nebraska Child Abuse Prevention Fund. This does not change that, the end result, other than the method on how it gets there. The money would be deposited to the General Fund and then is appropriated through the General Fund to the Nebraska Child Abuse Prevention Fund which is where they want the money to eventually be. The only thing it does permit in addition, because the statute requires \$250,000 per year to be transferred to this fund, it would permit the Legislature to offset the receipts, if they were from that sale, if it was significant, to offset the \$250,000 that is to be transferred. So, I would move adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Any discussion on the amendment offered by Senator Warner? If not, those in favor of the adoption of the amendment please vote aye, opposed nay. On the Warner amendment, have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Warner's amendment.
