SPEAKER BARRETT: You've heard the motion. Anything for the record before the vote is taken, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, 515 is reported indefinitely postponed, that is offered by Senator Hartnett as Chairman of Urban Affairs. Senators Wesely and Morehead have amendments to 116; Senators Lynch and Hartnett to 599; Senator Wesely to 564; Senator Chambers to 430. LB 55, 185, 185A, 203, 211, 319, 538, 608, 615, 642 are reported correctly Engrossed, Mr. President. That is all that I have. (See pages 1600-02 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. A request for a machine vote. The question is, shall the body adjourn? Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 9 ayes, 18 nays on the motion to adjourn, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The motion fails. Back to the Withem amendment. Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Will Senator Withem yield to a question?

SENATOR WITHEM: (Response inaudible.)

SENATOR MOORE: Senator Withem, how many Class Is are accredited, any idea?

SENATOR WITHEM: There are 18 that are now accredited.

SENATOR MOORE: Eighteen are now accredited. Just because I don't know, does accreditation, does that have to deal with the size of a Class I? I mean, is there a small class...is there a rule...are there small Class Is that are accredited, say, less than 20 people?

SENATOR WITHEM: Accreditation has to deal with the type of program that is offered. My guess is that those that are accredited, this is a guess, tend to be the larger Class Is.

SENATOR MOORE: But a Class I, regardless of size, if they are willing to fork over the money and do the job, they could become accredited.

SENATOR WITHEM: They could, yes.
