It's through a movement of dollars into corporations and other enterprises for the acquisition by those corporations and other enterprises of capital goods. That enhances productivity. To the extent that you and I encourage the movement or the maintenance of capital in our state, as opposed to the flight of capital to other states, we encourage enhanced productivity in Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, I support the amendment, the reconsideration, and I talked to a number of you the other day and I think there should be, if the people stick, enough votes to get the reconsideration motion. So I hope that we do vote the reconsideration, then we can go on with it and extend the discussion of the issue itself. But I am in favor of the reconsideration motion.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Rupp, then Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR RUPP: I call the question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lynch, did you wish to close, please.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President and members, it will just take a minute. I have a madness in my motive regarding the reconsideration of this particular...this particular provision of the bill. I think economic development in the state should have and should be able to reach and help a considerable number of people. There have been, as explained by Senator Nelson, a number of pieces of legislation that economically are affected by our decisions, budget and otherwise.
