

PRESIDENT: Did you want to rebut that, Senator Lamb?

SENATOR LAMB: Well, Mr. President, without looking at the rule book, I think there is something in there that says that the color of the amendment should be similar to that of the bill, that we should be talking about the same subject, and I don't believe we are doing that with this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Yes, I would rule that it is not germane. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No comment.

PRESIDENT: I thought I was going to be challenged. Senator Warner or Senator Higgins, did you wish to talk about...well, I guess it is not germane so we are back to the Coordsen amendment...about the Coordsen amendment, either one of you? Senator Warner. Senator Higgins, on the Coordsen amendment? Okay, did you wish to close, Senator Coordsen? Oh, Senator Lamb, excuse me.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, I have had my light on, Mr. President, and I just wanted to comment that I have no objection to Senator Coordsen's amendment, that it really makes very little difference whether the money goes directly into the General Fund and then is appropriated back to the Motor Vehicles Department, but it is a clean way to do it, the way he suggests, so I would not object to that amendment.

PRESIDENT: Okay, the question is the adoption of the Coordsen amendment. All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Coordsen's amendment to the bill.

PRESIDENT: The Coordsen amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to indefinitely postpone the bill. The introducer would have the option to lay the bill over.

PRESIDENT: What do you say, Senator Lamb?

SENATOR LAMB: Let's take it up at this point.
