SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, but I am going to your use of the term "pornographer". When you used pornographer, were you restricting the application of that term to people who sell this material and make a living out of it, not quibbling with the definition of what is obscene or appealing to the prurient interest right now, is that what you meant by pornographer or did you mean the term to be broad enough to embrace anybody who would do something in violation of this law?

SENATOR PIRSCH: I believe it is defined in the Child Pornography Act.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I have so much trouble making Senator Pirsch understand what I am asking. Here was my question. I will ask it and answer it. She said don't worry about that poor pornographer. And that is not the one that I am worried about. What I was trying to find out from the introducer of the bill is if she feels that anybody who would violate this law is a pornographer, and if that is what she meant, then the students are pornographers, and we are not being precise in our use of language, and we are causing things to be put into the law because we don't have clear concepts of what it is we are dealing with. Now Senator Hall mentioned condoms. Senator Hall, some of those rooms where they sell them could be called condominiums, and I know you expected jokes. They say obscene material appeals to the prurient interest. Well, now they say the "Peru-rient" interest since they sell condoms, but I give them credit for recognizing the reality that is out there and taking a step that is education par excellence. They are not dealing with that which is abstract, that which is conceptual, and I don't mean that as a pun, Senator Hall, but they are dealing with a day-to-day reality that has to be addressed. It would be very nice if we could make things disappear by simply ignoring them. Smallpox would never have gone away if people said we can get rid of it by closing our eyes. We can get rid of infantile paralysis, as they used to call that disease, by...
