PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Abboud, please, then Senator Wesely. Senator Wesely and then Senator Hall.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Mr. President, members, there is so much confusion about this issue. I think it's in the best interest, actually, to pass over the bill. Let me tell you what will happen. It may sound logical to follow Senator Hall and Senator Chambers. If you do that, you go into a situation where those people that don't take the test, refuse to take the test, the best option is to simply instead of just accepting the suspension and the administrative suspension is go to court, take up the court time, take up and attempt to try and convict them and if they are found guilty, they will get the conviction but they will get less of a suspension but they will build up a conviction, but, secondly, they can't lose because if they're not guilty and without the breathalyzer it will be much easier to do that. They will end up with the reduction and so you end up actually in a situation that's worse than better. You'll clog up the system much worse and you won't accomplish the goals. You'll just end up complicating things much worse than intended. I know that there has been some confusion raised by some people on this, but I can assure you that the experts in the field of DWI, the prosecutors, the highway safety people have all felt comfortable with the bill as it originally was and I think, Senator Hall, I think you didn't miswrite your amendment that we adopted, that in fact, that what I was saying is that you'll end up forcing people to take court action and try to come out of it either way ahead of what they think would be the case under administrative revocation. This is not a solution to the problem and, in fact, would make things worse. So I would encourage, if you'd like to, Senator Hall, you may want to consider just giving us some time to work on this some more. I think the original bill was in form to be handled, but evidently some people have looked at it of late and come up with some different interpretations. I think all of it can be explained but at this point it's very difficult to work through the options and the answers to the questions, but this solution will only make it far worse, I think.
