

SENATOR SMITH: I'm not....

SENATOR LAMB: It says to eliminate provisions on electrical inspections in rural areas and on farmsteads. I guess I would like to know what that is all about.

SENATOR SMITH: I'm sorry that I can't answer that question for you, Senator Lamb. I don't...that was not brought to my attention and I have the breakdown of the different sections of the bill. This was not anything that was brought out in the hearing either.

SENATOR LAMB: Okay. Well, I suppose....

SENATOR SMITH: Oh, electrical standards, it is talking about, in Section 6, deletes the requirement that a report from a licensed architect, then it goes on and down below it it says...it talks about the State Fire Marshall does not order modifications or repairs based solely on structural problems with the building, but rather orders compliance with public safety codes which cover primarily electrical standards and sufficient existing capacity. That is the only thing that even, in my understanding, has any information or any reference to electrical code.

SENATOR LAMB: You say in Section 6?

SENATOR SMITH: It's unnecessary because the State Electrical Division takes care of that requirement.

SENATOR LAMB: I see.

SENATOR SMITH: That is the information that just came to me from outside, from his office.

SENATOR LAMB: I see. Okay, thank you very much.

SENATOR SMITH: You bet.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Nelson, please.

SENATOR NELSON: I know time is running. I had a lesson on this my first year down here, so I don't intend to run out Senator Smith's bill. But, Senator Lamb, I think what we're talking about or what you're referring to reporting the fires, we have a
