PRESIDENT: Thank you. We will move on to Final Reading. Will you please return to your seats. I understand we are going to pass over LB 377 and move on to LB 435. Please return to your seats so that we can begin Final Reading. (Gavel.) We are ready to start Final Reading. Please return to your seats. (Gavel.) For those of you not in your seats, you are holding up the process. Please return to your seats. Mr. Clerk, LB 435, please.

CLERK: (Read LB 435 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 435 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See pages 881-82 of the Legislative Journal.) 44 ayes, 0 nays, 1 present and not voting, 4 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 435 passes. LB 551, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a motion on the desk. Senator Goodrich would move to return LB 551 to Select File for a specific amendment. The amendment is found on page 742 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, please.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President and members of the body, on this particular amendment, it was discovered that the bill refers to members and members...wait a minute, I better explain something first. This deals with state retirement systems for state...in the state program for state...for teachers, in other words. And the bill refers to members which includes any retired members and, consequently, it was not intended that the retired members could come back and buy back previous years of service at other schools and other facilities, like ESUs and stuff. So we have to change the word "member" to designate it so that just the active teachers are the ones that are buying back. I would move the adoption of the amendment.
