I think, when it is realized where the bill was and that maybe some action was going to be taken and maybe not all together satisfactory, we had all sides come to an agreement, both sides give some, and I think that is the art of good legislation, it is compromise. One can very seldom have his own way exactly how he thinks something should be done. I'm very comfortable with this amendment right now and I hope that you will adopt the amendment.
