Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question is the override of the Governor's veto on LB 647. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

SENATOR NELSON: May I have a roll call vote, please?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Members, please check in. We've had a request for a roll call vote. Please record your presence. While you're checking in, for purposes of clarification, we do have additional motions to consider veto overrides on LB 942, LB 1143 and 1143A, LB 1221 and 1221A and 672. Please record your presence. Senator Labeledz, please report to the Chamber, record your presence. Senator Lynch, Senator Landis, Senator Warner. May we proceed, Senator Nelson? Senator Labeledz is on her way.

SENATOR NELSON: Yes.

SPEAKER BARRETT: On the motion to override the veto on 647, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken as found on page 2269 of the Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 24 nays, Mr. President, on the override of LB 647.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Motion fails. The Governor's veto is sustained. The A bill? Not necessary. Proceed then to LB 942.

CLERK: Senator, you don't want to do the A bill, right? Okay. Mr. President, the next motion I have is a motion to override on LB 942. That is offered by Senator Chizek.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Chizek, please.

SENATOR CHIZEK: Mr. President, colleagues, I know that we're all weary of the word veto. I was going to tell my good friend Senator Remmers to say it three times real quick, and that
