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like to be known as an American but I also like to have my heritage acknowledged. So when you say, are you Scottish, I say, yes, and Irish and German and Welsh. Should we not be willing to do the same for others as we claim for ourselves? As one of the co-introducers, I move the adoption of this resolution.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President and members, I apologize to this body. I apologize to Senator Schmit and anyone else that I may have offended. I did not mean to do that. I meant to ask what I thought was a legitimate question. I appreciate the explanations that have been made. I did not have in mind to separate this resolution from any of the other resolutions and nor did I encourage anyone else to do that. I simply asked a question which, had I to do it over again, I would not do that. But I do believe it was my right to question something about either that resolution or any other resolution that was being considered in a group. I will plead guilty to not having adequately studied those resolutions. So if I...those that I have offended and I know I have offended, I apologize for that but I guess I do believe I had the right to ask the question and I fully will plan to vote for the resolution.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Rod Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Question.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. Those in favor of ceasing debate, please vote aye, opposed nay. Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.
