SPEAKER BAACK: You have heard Senator Lindsay and Senator Chizek's closing, they were closing on the bill. A number of lights came on, but they were closing on the bill, on the advancement of the bill. So we will proceed to vote on the advancement of LB 181. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the advancement of LB 181. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on the advancement of 181.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 181 is advanced. We will now go to LB 181A, by Senator Chizek.

CLERK: LB 181A, by Senator Chizek. (Read title.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chizek.

SENATOR CHIZEK: Colleagues, the accompanying A bill, I'm trying to get a copy right now, I think it's under 200...it's like 248,000 for the judges and the support staff. And we're aware of what it is, and I would just ask for your support.

SPEAKER BAACK: To speak on LB 181A, Senator Smith. Senator Wickersham, did you wish to speak on LB 181A? No. Senator Haberman, did you wish to speak on LB 181A?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, I have a question of Senator Chizek. And, if he can't answer it, then I'll ask Senator Lindsay. Senator Chizek, can you give us a breakdown on the caseload, civil versus criminal?

SENATOR CHIZEK: Yes. Okay, new filings on felony cases, in 1990, there were 1,598 new felony cases filed, and there's been a 119 percent increase in the civil caseload, felony caseload has increased by 75 percent.

SENATOR HABERMAN: No, Senator Chizek, can you give me the numbers of civil cases versus criminal cases?

SENATOR CHIZEK: No, but I can get them for you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Pardon.
