The cigarette tax money of which we speak here is a variety of earmarks that lapse this biennium and next biennium, a large amount, 4 cents lapses in the second year of the next biennium, fiscal year '92-93, and some additional money frees up when the bonds are paid up in '94-95. In total, for those cigarette tax dollars for the next three years, or actually the three year...the next four years, because this year, the '91-92 fiscal year they're already committed, but for the remainder of the next two bienniums if you...all the total amount of cigarette tax money that frees up and no longer is committed, as you can see on your sheet, is about \$18.5 million. What LB 760 does is basically supplement that to the tune of a million and a half in General Funds, and there's 20 million dollars that the Appropriations Committee is being recommended spent on a variety of projects. I have handed out to you an explanation of committee amendment to LB 760. You can see that there are 11 different projects that are included in here. And you can see, as it flows out on here, to begin with (inaudible) confused that the present fisc...not the present fiscal year, but the next fiscal year, '91-92 does not show on this sheet because the old earmarking language is still there, does not lapse until '92-93. And you can see how the committee proposes to flow that money out through the three following years, or the next two bienniums. And so you're talking about a total of \$20 million. You'll see the project, talking about a business classroom in Wayne, a variety of things in agriculture and natural resources. One is, to begin with, a structure in Mead, a building that's been on the waiting list for a good number of years. Secondly, you have some...a variety of projects, the Elliott Building and the Panhandle Station in Scottsbluff, and move on to two different facilities in North Platte, move on to Section 6 of the Sandhills lab, I believe, in...I'm forgetting the name of the town, actually, that one is in. It's in the western part of the state. You'll see this fly-in research facility in Concord. Then you move on to Section 8 is probably one of the more notorious sections of the bill, that deals with the committee's recommendation on funding for the Beadle Center, and that is a project of the University of Nebraska that has a variety of matching federal funds, which I would assume many of you have heard a great deal about. And basically the committee recommendation is recommending a total of 6.5 million dollars be committed towards that project. Now what does the 6.5 million dollars actually fund, or what is our intent on this? Well, to begin with, I think as all of you are probably well aware of, the required nonfederal match for the 17.7 million in federal
