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PRESIDENT MOUL PRESIDING

PRESIDENT MOUL: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the George W. Norris Legislative Chambers. We will now reconvene. We'll proceed with roll call. Please record your presence. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: I have a quorum present, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Are there any items for the record?

CLERK: There are, thank you. Enrollment and Review reports Legislative Bill 714 and 714A as correctly engrossed, and a communication from the Governor to the Clerk. (Read Message from the Governor regarding LB 502, LB 651, LB 653, LB 857, LB 422 and LB 582. See pages 2725-26 of the Legislative Journal.) That's all that I have, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We will go back to Select File, LB 614.

CLERK: Madam President, the next amendment I have to LB 614, by Senator Schrock. (See AM2193 on pages 2726-29 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Madam President, members of the legislative body, I didn't want to run this amendment yet because I wanted Senator Dierks to run his first, but that not being possible because his is not available, I would ask the senators to consider what I am trying to do here today. Senator Elmer said to draw a plan that draws yourself out. This does draw myself out. I think when I walked through the doors here last January, District 39 was a marked district. It was in a right place. It was logical to move it east, and I have accepted that, not without some pain, but I have accepted that. I don't think anything we're going to do here today is going to change that. But I would like the senators to consider what this map does. There is a full-blown map up in the south side of the hall here. This map is basically the same map as Senator Bernard-Stevens has presented. It changes nine legislative districts and it only changes four of them in any drastic manner. I would hope that Senator Baack and Senator Wickersham and Senator Hillman could live with what's happened in the Panhandle here. I don't
