back to the Legislature with committee amendments. That's signed by Senator Chizek. Natural Resources reports LB 890 to General File; LB 948 to General File; LB 563, indefinitely postponed. Those signed by Senator Johnson. Banking Committee reports LB 907, LB 993 to General File with committee amendments attached to 993. And Urban Affairs Committee reports LB 369 to General File; LB 928, General File; LB 933, General File; LB 950, General File; LB 968, General File. That's all that I have, Mr. President. (See pages 460-63 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We'll now proceed to LB 111.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 111 was a bill introduced by Senator Pirsch. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 10 of last year, referred to Judiciary, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. LB 111 allows prosecutors to aggregate the value of property stolen during one scheme or course of conduct from one person, a very limited form of aggregation of theft. And that would determine the felony or misdemeanor classification of the offense. Our surrounding states, Iowa, South Dakota, Kansas, Wyoming, and Colorado have the aggregation of theft, and some even in a more liberal aggregation than ours. And, as I understand it, it was overlooked when the criminal statutes were redone, I think about in 1978, because we did have that before then. The...the aggregation of theft is particularly useful in the scheme of white collar crime where the educated person knows exactly...knows the law and knows exactly what they can pilfer or embezzle without becoming a felon. With that, I would move the advancement of LB 111.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Pirsch. Anyone wishing to speak to the advancement of LB 111? Seeing no one, Senator Pirsch, do you wish to close? Waives closing. We will now vote on the advancement of LB 111. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Voting on LB 111. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.
