SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Request a roll call vote.

SPEAKER BAACK: Roll call vote has been requested. In reverse order. We need Senator Schimek, there she is. Senator Labedz. Senator Chambers, would you record your presence, please. Thank you. Senator Haberman, would you record your presence, please. Senator Haberman, would you record your presence, please. Roll call vote in reverse order. Mr. Clerk, call the order.

CLERK: (Read roll call vote. See page 465 of the Legislative Journal.) 23 ayes, 7 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement.

SPEAKER BAACK: LB 465 does not advance. I will raise the call but I would encourage the members to stay close to the Chamber so we can continue to work through these consent calendar bills. We'll pass over then 465A and we'll proceed to LB 706.

CLERK: Mr. President, 706 a bill by Senator Ashford. (Title read.) The bill was introduced on January 23, referred to Government, advanced to General File. I have committee amendments pending.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Conway, on the committee amendments. Senator Schimek, Senator Schimek. we need some help on the Government Committee amendments and since you're the vice-chair, could you help us on that, LB 706?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I will try, Mr. Chairman, just a minute. Mr. President and members of the body, the amendment simply reduces the Historic Preservation Task Force from 16 members to one...to 11? To 11.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Mr. President, I think I could just explain the committee amendments a little further along with the bill, then we could...wouldn't have to do it again.

SPEAKER BAACK: Go right ahead, Senator.

SENATOR ASHFORD: This task force is now an 11 member task force, Historic Preservation Task Force chosen by the Governor. It has a two-year sunset.
