CLERK: Madam President, Senator Lindsay would move to amend. (See AM2623 on page 582 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: The amendment that I am offering is on page 582 of the Journal. It is amendments that were suggested by E & R to us but they were not amendments that E & R felt comfortable running as E & R amendments. They change, while there is nothing substantive, they change terminology. For example, the first one changes the term a person over nineteen years of age or a person nineteen years of age or older to adult; changes another area from "found" to "located". The amendment is printed in the Journal and it is amendments that were offered by E & R. I'd urge their adoption.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Does anyone wish to address this amendment? Seeing none, we will now vote on the Lindsay amendment. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Lindsay's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Landis would move to amend.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I passed out to your desks a list that was given to me by a group called Decisions in Dignity in Dying in which they identify many of the formalities of this bill that they find are troublesome. I do not share the need to change the bill along these lines, but I was doing that as a favor to them. There is one change that I would like to recommend to you. This bill has been very, very meticulously drawn and very carefully negotiated, but there is, in my estimation, a deficiency in it, and if I could explain it to you, I'd like to.
