We don't. If we can't, we can't. And, again, we had to go with a sales tax, or I did, the complete sales tax. There is no confusion on my part. I was forced to that position by the detractors of 1120 and their attempts to take away the funding. I was forced to that position. I oppose Senator Lynch's amendment and again request that the supporters of an income and sales philosophy be allowed to build a good piece of legislation, and you do the same with yours, and we will run them down the track and see who wins.
