SPEAKER BAACK: LR 251 is adopted. We will go to LR 252.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Peterson.

SENATOR PETERSON: Mr. President, members, I would like to...your support of this resolution for Mr. George Moyer, Sr. from Madison, Nebraska who died at the Norfolk Hospital last Sunday from complications of a fall. He was taking a shower, last week ago tonight, fell, broke his shoulder, and they put him in the hospital, and he died of apparent heart attack on Sunday at the ripe old age of 96. He was a very active person all his life, was never in a nursing home or anything, even went to the office not too many weeks ago for...in the afternoon for several hours of work. I've known Mr. Moyer practically all my life. He served in this...before it became a Unicameral, in the House here in 1927 to 1929. He's been an attorney since, if I recall right, about 1925 and, as I said, still practiced some law as up to a couple weeks ago. He started the Madison County Building and Loan, and it's probably the most stable building and loan in the country. He served in the Army, World War I in 1917 to 1918, two years. He's was the oldest practicing attorney in Nebraska. He was a school board member for many
