SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Robinson, you're next.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Mr. President and members of the body, I've never said anything provocative in my life, Senator Chambers, so you don't have to worry about me. But my family had a personal experience with the Boys Town Institute at St. Joseph Hospital. My grandson and his local school out in western Nebraska, in Gothenburg, was diagnosed as having attention deficit syndrome, at least they thought he did. Anyway, his mother took him to the Boys Town Institute at St. Joseph Hospital and he was given a thorough examination and found out that that wasn't the case. But we've had a...I know our family has had a very positive relationship, at least in this one instance, and I know they're doing a lot of things with learning disabilities, not only in Nebraska but throughout the country. So I would like to go on record as supporting this resolution. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Robinson. Any other discussion? Seeing none, Senator Horgan, do you wish to close?

SENATOR HORGAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members, I would simply again reiterate that this is Boys Town's seventy-fifth anniversary and I believe, and I think most people in Nebraska believe that they have served well the people of this state and the country and would ask for your endorsement of the resolution. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Horgan. You've heard the closing. We will now vote on LR 418. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on adoption of the resolution.

SPEAKER BAACK: The resolution is adopted. It does not appear on your agenda, but we will be doing LR 421 now, introduced by Senator Wesely.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 421, offered by Senator Wesely, is found on page 1776 of the Journal. It asks the Legislature to express its sympathy to the family of L.K. Emry and acknowledge his many contributions.
